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## Red Rubin Basil

*Ocimum basilicum 'Red Rubin'*

### Description:

An ornamental herb producing flower spikes adorned with white and purple flowers in mid summer; flavorful deep purple-red leaves; great for mixed containers, herb gardens, and annual beds

### Edible Qualities

Red Rubin Basil is an annual herb that is typically grown for its edible qualities, although it does have ornamental merits as well. The fragrant oval deep purple leaves with hints of dark red are usually harvested from early summer to early fall. The leaves have a pleasant taste.

The leaves are most often used in the following ways:

- Fresh Eating
- Cooking
- Seasoning

### Planting & Growing

Red Rubin Basil will grow to be about 16 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 12 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 10 inches apart. This fast-growing annual will normally live for one full growing season, needing replacement the following year.

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This plant is quite ornamental as well as edible, and is as much at home in a landscape or flower garden as it is in a designated herb garden. It should only be grown in full sunlight. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America. It can be propagated by cuttings; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.

Red Rubin Basil is a good choice for the edible garden, but it is also well-suited for use in outdoor pots and containers. It is often used as a 'filler' in the 'spiller-thriller-filler' container combination, providing a mass of flowers and foliage against which the larger thriller plants stand out. Note that when growing plants in outdoor containers and baskets, they may require more frequent waterings than they would in the yard or garden.
